

Why riding Galloping Goose No. 5 is so special: we stop in spectacular and scenic places for people to take lots of photos! The scene above overlooks the famous Toltec Gorge with the west portal of Rock Tunnel just ahead and to the left of No. 5. This was on our first day on our way from Chama to Antonito.

### FALL COLOR EXCURSION—A SPECTACULAR SUCCESS!!

The fourth and final excursion of the year, a Fall Color Special on the Cumbres & Toltec Scenic Railroad, was a spectacular way to end the 2012 season. All four days of operation were sold out, and No. 5 carried 110 enthusiastic passengers during the excursion. This is likely the most passengers we've hauled in such a short time. The fall colors were just at their peak and the days were sunny and warm. We managed to include 12 to 15 photo run-bys each day, and needless to say we had many very satisfied passengers. Our two esteemed Motormen, Larry Spencer and Louie Vallejos, both were very pleased with the excursion. Larry realized that once, when Louie was riding in the back, that this was the first time in eight years as motorman, that he was operating No. 5 without another motorman present in the cab. Louie was impressed that our passengers ranged from serious narrow gauge fans to casual riders who wanted to view the fall colors. When passengers expressed their appreciation for our operating No.5, Louie's response was that we appreciated them. Without passengers like themselves, we couldn't be operating No. 5!

Saturday, Sept. 29<sup>th</sup> was an exceptionally fun day. We had a Moonlight Dinner Special on Saturday evening with a late afternoon departure from Chama. This allowed No. 5's crew to chase the morning passenger train out of Chama, which on this weekend was pulled by two locomotives. Watching a double-header tackle the 13 miles of 4% grade on the west side of Cumbres Pass was an additional treat for our crew. The double-header is an annual event due to the popularity of the fall colors. Later that day we departed at 4:15 p.m. and the fall colors were made more brilliant in the late afternoon sunlight. After a delicious dinner of prime rib or baked chicken at Osier, we departed as the full moon was rising in the east. However clouds soon obscured the moonlight, but despite this, the day was a spectacular success!

# **How Galloping Goose No. 5 Got to Dolores**

The September 12, 1952 issue of the Dolores Star featured the article shown on the left. By the fall of 1952, abandonment of the Rio Grande Southern Railroad had been approved by the Interstate Commerce Commission (ICC) and removal of the rails had started about 12 miles north of Rico at Coke Ovens, a whistle stop and siding on the RGS. The article describes how Galloping Goose No. 5 got from Ridgway, where it was parked, to Dolores.


To prevent No. 5 from being scrapped and to preserve it as a reminder of Dolores's history as a railroad town, five Dolores businessmen, Jack Kinkade, Dr. E. G. Merritt, Newell Musgrave, Bill Wagner, and C. H. Webb formed the Dolores Rotary Club with the specific purpose of purchasing No. 5. Each man contributed fifty dollars to purchase No. 5 for \$250.


With rail removed at Coke Ovens and some sections of rail washed out between Rico and Dolores by heavy August rains, it was not possible to drive No. 5 all the way to Dolores. This required it to be moved by truck from Coke Ovens, which the article describes. At Dolores No. 5 was left on the ground and eventually moved to the west side of Flander's Park where it sat until 1995, when it was moved to its current location for restoration by the Galloping Goose Historical Society in 1997-98.


The entire community of Dolores—and certainly the GGHS—are indebted to Jack Kinkade, Dr. E. G. Merritt, Newell Musgrave, Bill Wagner, and C. H. Webb for their foresight and generosity in purchasing No. 5. Without their effort, No. 5 likely would have been scrapped or sold and hauled off to some distant location.

The two photos below are from the 9-19-52 Dolores Star. The left shows a Dolores County Caterpillar dragging No. 5 from the end of the rails onto State Road 145, which was gravel at that time. Grooves in the road are from No. 5's wheel flanges. The right photo shows the cat pushing No. 5 onto a flatbed truck for its final trip to Dolores. This rough handling may explain the bent steps at the back of No. 5.
